I had the honour of attending Tom Grape's funeral, a tribute and celebration to his long and wonderful life.

It was lovely to see that a few of The Friends had managed to make the journey and Tom's family really appreciated this. I am sure that many of you were there in spirit also.

Tom had countless stories to tell and many of us have been fortunate to hear them sat around the stove on a cold winter's morning down The Yard. One of them that comes to mind concerned *Sundew*, I think in the fifties, and occurred in Heigham Sound. We have all sailed close to those green posts but on this particular day *Sundew's* crew sailed a little too close and ripped the lee shrouds clean out of the hull. I don't remember Tom telling me how long they sat on a lee shore waiting for rescue but

in those days without mobiles it may have been some time.

I am sure that those of you who hired boats when Tom was working at The Yard will remember, possibly with a little trepidation, his passage down the dyke in a rowing boat with a pot of varnish ready to touch up any of those inevitable scuffs that occur when sailing!!

He was held in great respect and his memory will live on with The Fleet well into the future.

There will a memorial book at The Yard in which Friends can share their memories and perhaps add a photograph or two to commemorate Tom's life. This will be in place in time for the AGM.

I am looking forward to seeing and talking to many of you at the AGM in May and if you have any concerns or questions, please do not hesitate to give me a call on 07930 910870.

Yard Report February 2025

Belated best wishes for the new year to everyone! Suddenly the new season is rushing towards us. We always breathe a sigh of relief in October when the last hirer departs but we are now pleased to see the winter nearly behind us. We are looking forward to welcoming the first hirers of the season which will be the Kestrels and Swans young people's groups.

Thankfully we have only had one day so far this year with water through the sheds. As a result it is unusually dry. The varnishing is finished on the cabin boats, the electric engines are being serviced, masts varnished and Ian is prepping the rigging. We are working towards 10th March - cabin boat launch day.

As well as prepping the boats we are working through a general maintenance programme which includes new flooring and showers in the men's section, sprucing up the kitchen area and stripping, repairing and painting the windows fronting the car park. Much of the work is being done by a few volunteers.

In the office we have been pretty busy putting in a new accounts system - it is promising to make some admin tasks a great deal easier. A rolling programme of improvements is in place to the website and booking system. You may have seen activity, too, on the marketing side aimed at encouraging families and under 25s out sailing and also plugging the quiet times in the calendar at the beginning and end of the season. This year we'll be opening on Sundays in the peak period and offering half day and full day skippered sails as well

as the traditional 2hr sails.

Many Friends will remember that we took around 600 children and youngsters out sailing last year - for many of them this was their first experience on the Broads let alone a sailing boat. This year we are aiming to take about 400 children out and will be introducing some of them to the wherry *Albion* as well as working with the Broads Authority education department to show them some of the nature in the Broads.

The youth work is funded by the National Lottery Heritage Fund, Alan Boswell, Anguish Educational Foundation, Norwich Freemen's and the Ranworth Trust as well as small donations from individual Friends. We have funding through to January 2026. We are now putting together funding applications to extend the project for a further three years. There are three parts to the project - taking primary school children out sailing, working with Norwich charities to get their young people out sailing, and residential sailing on the cabin yachts for up to a week at a time for small groups. If any Friend would like to make an individual donation to support this work it will be very gratefully received.

A call out through the Ludham Parish Newsletter for volunteers has met with some success - we are extending this to adjacent parishes as we try to build the base of local volunteers. Help in basic jobs like mowing the grass, trimming the hedge, painting and helping out at events means that we can keep the yard spruced up while we concentrate on the boats and the hirers

hirers in the season.

This season we will complete the extensive repair work on *Swallow* which featured in the 1974 film of Arthur Ransome's Swallows and Amazons. Andrew is fitting new planks, frames, stem and other bits and pieces. When completed *Swallow* joins *Amazon* for hire from the yard for Swallows and Amazons enthusiasts. There will be a page on the website devoted to the boats, alongside our own *Lullaby* (*Teasel* in the films of Coot Club and The Big Six), *Dreadnaught* and *Titmouse*. New for the website is a guide to locations on the Broads featured in the book.

There has been some movement in moorings this season but all spaces are now full except for a new space in the top dyke. This will suit a boat of around 18ft or less so if you know anyone who is looking for a mooring, ask them to get in touch.

We hope to see many Friends this season - drop in any time for a cup of tea!

Memories of Tom- Tributes to Tom Grapes

Issue 29 of the Newsletter of the Friends of the Hunter Fleet, March 2007, celebrated Tom Grapes 60 years at the Yard. (See opposite reproduction of front cover)


Tom's amazing achievement was celebrated with a tribute article in the Eastern Daily Press. Tom also featured in an Anglia News broadcast and was honoured with a celebration meal courtesy of the Hunter Trustees.

It is hard to believe it, but Tom's start at the Yard in 1947 was not only in the post war years of continuing austerity, but also in one of the hardest winter we have ever experienced. (Tom cycled along the frozen river to work at the Yard because this was easier than battling snow drifts -up to 16 feet in places- along Horse Fen Road!).

Tom actually retired from the Yard in 1994, but the Yard found it difficult to cope without him so he continued in a part time capacity.

And indeed, Tom's presence at the Yard continued; he was at the Friends Autumn Picnic in September 2024, chatting to the many people who still remembered him. Tom sadly died on 30 October 2024.

St Catherine's church, Ludham was packed for his funeral service on 25 November 2024 with family, friends and neighbours from the village, sailing friends and Trustees and Friends of Hunters Yard.



The service was conducted by the Chair of Hunters Trustees, the Rev'd Neville Khambatta, with tributes from his younger brother, Ken who recalled what an excellent big brother Tom was, initiating him into the art of making a good catapult, from Tom's sons, grandchildren and the Rev'd Khambatta. It was a lovely service.

On the following pages, are further tributes, celebrating Tom's amazing 77 year association with Hunter's Yard.

Donations to Hunter's Yard in remembrance of Tom, collected at his funeral, are to be put to something special.

This article, written by Philip Bray, appeared on the front of the December Issue of the Hunters Yard Newsletter

"With great sadness, we announce the death of Tom Grapes, a true part of Hunter's Yard and Broads history, who worked at the Yard for more than 60 years.

Tom was born in Fleggburgh on 3 November 1929 and a year later the family moved to Ludham where his father worked as a gardener at The Grange. His grandfather was a thatcher and his great grandfather ran the last wherryman's pub at St Benet's.

He went to schools in Ludham and Stalham until he was 16 when he went to work as a gardener/odd job man in the village.

He told a wonderful wartime story of he and friends finding a radio transmitter hidden at St Benet's Abbey which resulted in two German spies being arrested at Wroxham.

At 17 he joined the Royal Marines and trained at Deal and Lympstone before being medically discharged.

He returned to Ludham and went looking For a job at Hunter's Yard.

There, he met Stanley (Percy's younger son) who offered him a job on the understanding that he also joined the Ludham volunteer fire brigade. He did all sorts of jobs, learnt his varnishing skills from Stanley and helped Cyril with boatbuilding, including building *Wood Anemone*. His day was 8.15 am to 5 pm for £5 per week.

He married Edna in 1952 and had two sons, Graham and Ian. He took his family on camping holidays and later upgraded to a camper van. Edna died young in 1976, and in 1992 he married Pam, who predeceased him.

When the boat yard was sold to Norfolk County Council he continued and became a council employee. He did any job that needed to be done, including all the signwriting on the yachts, until he retired in October 1994.

But he couldn't keep away and came back to help for two days week for NCC and then the Trust.



He retired again in October 2010 after 63½ years working at Hunter's Yard but still frequently visited. He always enjoyed chatting to customers and to Friends at their events. He could be seen on most Saturdays going round the boats sitting in a dinghy and touching up the varnish. He died on 30 October and is survived by his brother, sister, two sons and four grandchildren."

Memories of Tom Grapes

Some personal memories from Jennifer, granddaughter of Percy Hunter and daughter of Cyril Hunter.

"My memories of Tom go back to 1947 when he started work at the Yard and I was eight years old!

I was a regular visitor during the letting season on the Saturday morning changeover days when I took "elevenses" to my father, Cyril, to have while he was cleaning the boats. Tom was involved in cleaning all the kitchen utensils so that the pots and pans were shining and ready for the next customers.

The other things that I always associate with Tom is his preparation of the rigging in the winter, varnishing the quants and masts and ensuring that there were always spares available for the inevitable accidents, all to the extremely high standards that Percy expected from everyone.

While the boats were being cleaned inside, Tom was regularly seen in a dinghy with a pot of varnish meticulously touching up marks on all the boats so that they gleamed in the sunshine ready for the next customers. More than anything else, his painting skills on the transom after the minimum of five layers of varnish had been employed were second to none. I shall always remember him sitting with an old lamp over his shoulder and painting the

Name and burgee with enviable accuracy. Sadly, Percy died in 1964. This was a major blow to Cyril and Stanley who struggled on for a couple of years without Percy, meaning there was a serious threat to the Yard's existence and the probability of having to put it up for sale.

However, luck was on their side because the appearance of the Yard on the market coincided with the Norfolk County Council's (NCC's) wish to establish a sailing base for Norfolk children. The result was that the NCC became the new owners of the Hunter Fleet in 1968 when the Yard was renamed "The Norfolk County Sailing Base" with Les Gee as the Fleet Warden and Tom retained as a Yard Hand.

The next milestone for Tom was in 1994 when the NCC's budget came under pressure and Tom "officially" retired after 47 years of continuous service. As Graham and Ian were the only full-time staff Tom, unsurprisingly, couldn't resist the pull of the Yard and he agreed to come back part time to help with the winter maintenance. In February1995 the NCC, with limited funds available, decided to sell the Hunter Fleet. This caused an immediate outcry from the public with a "Save Our Sail Fleet" campaign by the EDP. Things moved with amazing speed and by 1st March a Norfolk Heritage Fleet steering group was set up and became the sole bidder resulting in the launch of the appeal to purchase the Fleet on 1st April 1996.

Again, Tom was retained in his parttime role.

The Yard was re-named Hunter's Yard with the original Hunter Burgee and continued it's original business of private letting, as well as school trips, with great success over the holiday periods.

2007 was a memorable year for Tom. To mark the 60th Anniversary of his employment and this great achievement, Tom featured in a tribute article in the EDP as well as a celebration Lunch provided by the Trust.

Tom always called himself the "Odd Job Man". He was very proud to have helped with the new build "*Lucent*" for which he made up the rigging, applied all the coats of varnish and painted the name and burgee on the stern.

Tom finally retired "properly" in 2007 but was down at the Yard quite often! I saw a lot more of him after I came back to live in Norfolk and we would always have a chat on occasions when Friends gathered at the Yard. Latterly we joked about the "joys" of growing old! The Autumn Picnic in September last year was the last time I saw Tom and, although he looked quite poorly, he was still up for that chat.

Hunter's Yard was very fortunate to have had the benefit of Tom's loyal service over 60 years, including several major changes to the Yard.

His was a good life well lived.

.....And some memories of Tom from David Clarke

"When I began skippering my own boat we always had a yacht with an engine because that is what my family always did.

One day we ended up mooring in the evening at the end of Hunter's dike.

In the morning we walked up to the boatshed and introduced ourselves at the office where we were given a brochure; then we went on our way.

Later that summer we discussed having about four days on a Hunter's boat. We had a great deal of apprehension about sailing with no engine. Setting off and docking were the main problems. By the end of the summer we had decided to give the Hunter's boats a try. A boat was booked with Mrs Webb and one Saturday we arrived.

Tom was detailed to introduce us to the boat, we knew what to do to sail. He said the Hunter's boats sailed easier than others, the keel and rudder gave steerage well below walking pace and coming up to a mooring the speed must be reduced right down and the boat will still steer well. Lifting the boom on the topping lift may not be enough to slow the boat.

I must have looked a bit doubtful about all of this so Tom asked which boats I had sailed before- I told him and he replied with all the problems and advantages of those boats I had sailed. I was convinced, Tom knew about the boats on the Broads and he wasn't giving me sales patter. I only ever hired one more non Hunters boat after that. Thanks for the introduction, Tom. If it wasn't for you I probably wouldn't be a member of the Friends of Hunter's Yard.

Friends Write....

From John Pugh

With reference to Tom Grapes, was he any relation to the Grapes who ran the pub at Thurne(*No!*)

My father took me to the pub in Easter 1946 to see if they had survived the War. My father was one of the few 'outsiders' that Herbert Woods allowed to race in the Regatta he organised at the end of the letting season, for the staff of the yard at Potter. They raced for The Gold Cup which was presented at the Grape's pub during the special dinner given by Herbert Woods for all the staff. My father and his best friend were assumed as staff for the night. They stayed there on many occasion.

My father and his friend bought the Yarmouth O/D 'Pimpernel' just before the War from Herbert Woods and raced her in many regattas. By co-incident I saw Pimpernel this last Spring for the first time nce we sold her back in the late '50s.

Kind regards, *John*PS I have a photo of our two frozen crews at Acle Bridge on our last morning at Easter 1957, having had a good week's sailing in *Hustler 2 and 3*.

I was very interested to read the small paragraph in the Friends newsletter, issue 79 (Nov 2023) about "Archived for Posterity".

I was first introduced at the tender age of 4 in 1964 to Hunters Yard by my father John Dale and his brother Derek, both of whom worked as telephone engineers for the

GPO, now of course BT. Over the years they taught me the finer points of sailing a Hunters boat even to the point of sailing singlehandedly, a feat my uncle was very adept at.

Derek passed away back in 1998 leaving my father to sort out and clear his flat. Among his brothers' belongings were a large pile of various Broads photographs, holiday invoices, letters and other Percey Hunter & Sons, Ltd paperwork. My father too has now passed away, July 2022, leaving me and my brother to sort out his own possessions. Both my uncle and father came from a generation that never throw anything away..... sound familiar to any of the Friends?

In hindsight I'm so glad they didn't, as I now have in my possession both of their

The half model of the Hustler was built by a gentleman by the name of Peter Ward in Poole. I took measurements from one of the Hustlers (number 4 I think) and gave them to Peter. The aim of the exercise was to present this amazing model to my father for his 70th birthday as a family present. It has hung on the wall at the bottom of the stairs in the family home for 25 years now. I have inherited it since my fathers death but would love the "Yard" to have it if you canaccommodate it.

Should these time capsules of Hunters Yard history be of interest I would very much like to come and visit the yard again. It has been a long time since I last visited as I now live in Wales but do visit my brother in Saffron Walden every so often so a visit to the "Yard" is not out of the question when we could meet to hand over to the correct person.
